NEW APP TO HELP REPAIR SHARED BUILDINGS TAKES OFF ACROSS SCOTLAND

An app to help the owners of shared properties repair their buildings in the Capital has been so successful in its first year it is already being rolled out by two other local authorities in Scotland.

Developed by the City of Edinburgh Council with tech company Novoville, a <u>new</u> <u>app</u> launched in April last year has been helping more than 500 tenements with nearly 5,000 properties across Edinburgh in carrying out £700,000 worth of much needed repairs to improve their buildings.

We all have horror stories about common repairs & maintenance. Now, Novoville Shared Repairs is changing the narrative. Join hundreds of tenements and thousands of owners looking after their building with our award-winning platform.

FOR HOMEOWNERS


Born out of the Scottish Government's CivTech Accelerator programme, the app was designed to make it easier for residents living in shared properties to keep their buildings in good condition. It's attracted twice as many privately owned tenements in a year as the Council usually deals with in that time frame.

The repairs carried out range from £50,000 for extensive roof repairs down to £200 for new door locks, through to £20,000 improving stonework, £5,000 repainting stairwells to £2,000 on new gutters. Around 150 trusted traders are listed on the app but you can use it with your own trader as well.

Bursaries of £1,150 are available (£750 for a lead artist and £400 for materials and collaborators). In addition, up to £350 is available for travel and accommodation for those outside of Glasgow.

Theatres Trust Small Grants Scheme

Small grants are available for essential works to not-for-profit theatres in the UK that will enable them to be viable and thrive i/n the future.

Background and Objectives of Fund

The Theatres Trust is the national advisory public body for theatres in the UK. Set up by the Government through an Act of Parliament in 1976, it works to promote the better protection of theatres for the benefit of the nation. The Small Grants scheme is supported by the Linbury Trust. The scheme aims to fund small capital improvements to theatres run by charities and not-for-profit groups that will make a big impact to a theatre's resilience, sustainability or accessibility, or improving the diversity of audiences. This can include works to make theatres COVID-secure and ready to reopen. Grants of up to £5,000 are available.

Fidelio Charitable Trust

Grant funding to help individuals (over school age) and groups of exceptional ability in the UK that would not otherwise be able to carry out an artistic project or activity without financial support.

Maximum value:	£5,000
Application deadline:	30/09/2022

Background and Objectives of Fund

The Fidelio Charitable Trust was established in 2008 in support of the Arts in the United Kingdom. The Trust aims to help individuals and groups of exceptional ability who would not be able to carry out an artistic project or activity without financial support, particularly those who are at an early stage in their careers. Grants of up to £5,000 are available. The Trust's funds are limited, and it may only be able to part-fund a project or activity.

Who Can Apply and Further Information

Applications are accepted on behalf of individuals (over the age of 21) and groups who are practitioners or performers in the Arts. Proposed grantees must be in real need of financial support

and be particularly able and/or gifted. Applicants must be recommended by an appropriate person in an institution, college, arts festival or other arts organisation that can vouch for the abilities of the applicant. There is no nationality restriction and the work for which money is sought may be overseas but the proposed recipient(s) must be based in the UK.

The following are not eligible for funding:

- Individuals or groups seeking funding for themselves or their children without support from Institutions, Colleges, Arts Festivals or other arts organisations in the UK or by persons with recognised relevant expertise.
- Activities for people under the age of 21.
- Course fees.
- Capital items.
- Retrospective costs.

The Trust welcomes applications in support of the Arts, in particular particularly for Music, including Opera, Lieder, Composition and Dance. Grants may be awarded to enable individuals or groups of exceptional ability to the following:

- Receive special tuition or coaching, eg in the case of musicians, to attend Master Classes.
- Participate in external competitions.
- Be supported for a specially arranged performance.
- Receive support for a special publication, musical composition or work of art.

How to Apply

Trustee meetings are normally held three times a year, in the spring, summer and autumn. The next deadline is 30 September 2022. The trustees aim to inform successful applicants within two months of the relevant closing date. Applications should be submitted by email.

Austin and Hope Pilkington Trust

Grants are available to registered UK charities that work with communities in the UK for projects that address specific categories set out by the Trust each year.

Maximum value:	£5,000
Application deadline:	31/07/2022

Background and Objectives of Fund

The Austin and Hope Pilkington Trust offers funding to UK registered charities whose work takes place in the UK. The funding is intended to support those in society who face the greatest challenges and whose opportunities are the most limited. The Trust operates a three-year rotation system, with different fields of interests being funded each year:

- In 2022, the focus is on the Arts. There will be a specific focus in the first two rounds on people in the early stages of their career, specifically performers and creatives. The third and fourth rounds will focus on projects that seek to address the under-representation of BAME people in all sections of the arts.
- In 2023, the first two rounds will be focused on rehabilitation of prisoners, ex-prisoners, and those at risk of offending. The third and fourth round on children and young people in care and care leavers.

The Trust awards grants of either £1,000 or £5,000 depending on the grant round:

- Round 1 £1,000
- Round 2 £5,000
- Round 3 £1,000
- Round 4 £5,000

The level of grant awarded is determined by the income of the charity:

- Grants of £1,000 are available for charities with an operating income of between £100,000 and £2 million.*
- Grants of £5,000 are available for charities with a minimum operating income of £1 million. There is no maximum level.

Charities may only apply for one grant per calendar year.

Support is available for the following priorities in 2022:

- Rounds 1 and 2 The Arts: People in the early stages of their career (these rounds have now closed).
 - Performers and creatives
 - Employees within arts organisations
 - Rounds 3 and 4 The Arts: BAME (Black, Asian, Minority Ethnic) communities
 - o BAME performers
 - o Outreach projects within BAME communities
 - o Initiatives to increase participation with BAME communities

Support is available for the following priorities in 2023:

- Rounds 1 and 2 Rehabilitation of prisoners, ex-prisoners, and those at risk of offending.
- Rounds 3 and 4 Children and young people in care and care leavers.

The project must fall within the relevant category for the year the application is submitted and organisations may only make one application during any one year.

How to Apply

There will be four grant rounds in 2022. The application windows are as follows:

- Round 1 has now closed.
- Round 2 has now closed.
- Round 3 will open on 1 July 2022 and close on 31 July 2022.
- Round 4 will open on 1 September 2022 and close on 30 September 2022.

Application forms are available to complete online at the <u>Trust's website</u>. The Trust no longer accepts applications submitted by post. Applicants should first read the guidelines and FAQs before starting the application process. Charities can only apply for one round per calendar year. The Trust publishes a list of successful applicants after the trustee meetings. Those who have received funding will find their name on the Trust's website in the 'Successful Applicants' section. The Trust does not accept telephone calls.

Art Fund - Reimagine Grants

Grants are available for formally constituted, not-for-profit museums and arts galleries, most of whom will hold collections that are accessible to the public, to develop or refresh their work in response to the challenges posed by the pandemic.

Maximum value:	£50,000
Application deadline:	None specified

Background and Objectives of Fund

Art Fund is an independent membership-based charity, which raises funds to aid the acquisition of artworks for the nation. It gives grants and acts as a channel for many gifts and bequests, as well as lobbying on behalf of museums and galleries and their users. The grants programme has been developed in response to the unique challenges presented by Covid-19 and designed to inspire creativity and increase stability in the sector. It supports organisations to develop or refresh their work in response to their current situation with emphasis on encouraging curiosity, openness and reflection through the programme.

In 2022, the key aim of the Reimagine programme is to help organisations reimagine their approach to engagement. The funding is for projects that are:

- Creative or innovative
- Context-specific
- Impactful
- Engaging.

There is a total of £1.8 million available for 2022. Grants of between £10,000 and £50,000 are available. It is expected that projects will generally be completed within two years, though three years will be considered if necessary.

How to Apply

There is one funding round in 2022. The application window opens on 4 July and closes at 17:30 on 12 September 2022 with notification of decisions by early December 2022. Guidance notes, FAQs, the budget template form, and access to the application forms can be found on the <u>Art Fund</u> <u>website</u>. Applicants must create a My Art Fund account on the Art Fund website in order to access and submit the application form. Applicants must be registered as a professional user, ie, professional details are required.

Continuo Foundation

Grants are available for period music ensembles to support live performances across the UK, particularly in areas that lack access to high-quality live music.

Maximum value:	£10,000
Application deadline:	15/08/22

Background and Objectives of Fund

The Continuo Foundation supports live performances of period music from before 1850 played on instruments for which the music was composed (historically informed performance) and helps period-instrument musicians become more financially stable, whilst engaging audiences of all ages across the UK with live period performances. Since 2021, the Foundation has awarded over £350,000 in grants to 71 projects and 176 performances across three funding rounds. This fund aims to support professional

ensembles playing period music and instruments by mobilising projects of outstanding artistic merit and creating meaningful work for freelance period musicians.

The focus of Round Four is to support ensembles to plan and carry out a range of artistically excellent projects that will bring live period music to communities across the UK, particularly those that lack access to high-quality live music, as well to help newly formed ensembles to establish themselves. A total of £100,000 is available. Grants of between £2,000 and £10,000 are available. The Foundation expects to award grants to approximately 20 ensembles in this round. The final numbers will depend upon the quality of the applications received and the amounts requested. Grants can be for up to a maximum of 90% of the project cost. Applicants will be asked to demonstrate alternate sources of funding.

How to Apply

Guidance notes and an online application form are available from the <u>Continuo Foundation's</u> <u>website</u>. Decisions are expected by 22 September 2022.

Marsh Charitable Trust

Grants are available for UK registered charities that are working in the fields of social welfare, healthcare, arts and heritage, environmental causes and animal welfare, and education and training.

Maximum value:	£2,000

Background and Objectives of Fund

The Marsh Charitable Trust (formerly Marsh Christian Trust) was founded with the sum of £75,000 by Brian Marsh in 1981. The Trust's aim is to contribute to and promote the excellent work which is being undertaken across the charitable sector. It provides long-term core funding to small charities and run an Awards programme for individuals and groups committed to social, cultural and environmental causes. It supports around 350 charities every year through its grants programme and gives around 80 different awards to individuals and groups from across the charity sector. It maintains a policy of making a comparatively large number of modest grants each year. The Trust provides grants to UK registered charities working in the fields of social welfare, literature, arts and heritage, environmental and animal welfare, education and training. Grants range from £300 to £2,000 with new applications at the lower end of this scale.

How to Apply

Applications can be made at any time. The Trust does not have a standard application form. All applications should be made in writing and sent by post to the Marsh Charitable Trust. The application should consist of a cover letter of roughly one to two sides, and a full set of the most recent audited accounts should be enclosed. There is no deadline for receipt of applications. Applications are processed on an ongoing basis and are usually administered within two months of receipt. However, due to the volume of appeals, responses to new appeals may take a little more time. A response is made to every appeal whether it is successful or not.

National Heritage Memorial Fund - COVID-19 Response Fund

Grants are available to community and public sector organisations in the UK for projects to protect nationally important heritage assets that are at risk due to the impact of coronavirus (COVID-19).

Background and Objectives of Fund

The COVID-19 Response Fund is a £40 million fund being distributed by the National Heritage Memorial Fund (NHMF). The fund comprises two lots of £20 million:

- NHMF has made a commitment of £20 million, which is available to applicants from across the UK.
- A £20 million Cultural Assets Fund has been made available by the Department for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS) as part of the UK Government's wider Culture Recovery Fund. This funding will safeguard nationally important heritage assets within England.

The purpose of the fund is to help safeguard and save the UK's most important heritage assets which are in jeopardy due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The fund has a total value of £40 million. There are no minimum or maximum levels of grant. However, NHMF operates as a fund of last resort - applicants must show that they have explored, or are exploring, all other possible sources of funding, including their own resources.

How to Apply

Applications may be made at any time until the fund's final closing date of 30 April 2023. The first step is to submit an expression of interest using the online grants portal available on the <u>NHMF</u>

<u>website</u>. Eligible applicants will then be invited to submit a full application.
